

Weight: 2,800 Tons Dimensions: 418'W x 107'L Equipment Used: 104 axle lines of SPMTs, loading ramps, 18 high volume water pumps, 425' x 126' x 25' deck barge, numerous 65 ton winches and tugs. The Berard Team was proud to once again take a pinnacle role in transporting the Navy's newest addition to its fleet, the Omaha, a 418'L x 107'W Littoral Combat Ship (LCS) built with pride by Austal in Mobile, Alabama. Berard provided a turnkey service and accomplished the task using 104 axle lines of self-propelled modular transporters. The team rolled the 2,800 ton LCS from the final assembly bay to a waiting deck barge, all in record time and keeping the project ahead of schedule. The Omaha was then barged down river for trans-loading from deck barge to drydock. The entire process was accomplished safely and in only one day.





on the Road Machinery On The Move

12 axle Goldhofer THP trailer 9 axle hydraulic drop-deck 6 axle hydraulic drop-deck Importing cargo is always a challenge, and these three machinery packages destined for a plant in Louisiana were no different. The plan for this cargo was to receive from ship at the Port of New Orleans, barge to a protected channel near Baton Rouge, roll-off onto land and transport 10 miles over public roadways. A late request to fully support the cargo bottom created a change in the transport plan. No longer could the cargo be elevated on beams for a roll-off operation. Berard quickly changed the transport plan to a smaller barge, contracted a 300 ton derrick barge, and lifted the cargo from barge to truck in the congested channel. Berard then transported the 22' high the cargo through a populated area to the final destination. The cargo was then self-offloaded using hydraulic trailers, saving the end client the cost of having a crane to offload.
